ALDÉ COLLIN He Made us all Smile by Ernie Bies October 2016

Hearst lost one of its most beloved characters on October 13, 2016 when our good friend Aldé Collin was called to join the cast of entertainers in the sky. Born in 1937, he was an all around sportsman, entertainer, clown, haberdasher and good guy. Everyone has an Aldé story or two to tell. I've taken the liberty to share a few of my memories from long ago and borrowed photos from Alan Jansson's Old Hearst collection to honour Aldé. This account is just about the public Aldé and I will leave the personal details for his family to share.

His real sporting passion was fastball where he was a standout third baseman with the Hearst Lumberkings. Baseball skills aside, his true value was that of the ultimate pest as he drove the other teams nuts with his antics. At times he would stand closer to home plate than to third base and chatter at the opposing batters as Ray Lafleur delivered his pitches. The batters would be more focussed on trying to bat the ball down his throat than getting a base hit and would usually mess it up.

He played on his share of championship teams.

Aldé worked at Ted Wilson's Men's Wear on George St. For years and could fit you by just



looking at you.

"I have fond memories. I learned a lot from Aldé about selling men's clothing in the years that I worked part time at Ted's. He had a great sense of humour and was sincerely focused on customer service. And they kept coming back." -Jean Tanguay

He also worked in sales at the CINN radio, the local station.

Aldé was always ready with a joke to ease the tension. I remember when his sister Cecile invited me for coffee with her mom. Aldé walked in and asked if my coffee was hot enough and proceeded to check it by shoving his whole hand into my cup much to his mother's horror.

But he could be serious too. At a New Year's Eve dance at the arena some of the boys got a bit unruly. Billy Lussier and I had just separated two would be combatants and we thought things had calmed down. Apparently not. A few minutes later I saw Aldé leading one of them to the trainer's room for repairs. This hapless fellow made the mistake of challenging Aldé when he told him to settle down only to get a right cross in the eye that required stitches. Aldé sewed him up and let him come back to the dance. A party wasn't a party in Hearst without a few fights.
